SAFETY MOMENT: BEHAVIOR AROUND CAMPFIRES

Campfires are a powerful part of the outdoor experience. They can be lively with laughter, storytelling, and fellowship. The campfire can also be a time of reflection, learning, and great peace. Safe behavior around a campfire ensures a good time can be had by all while mitigating the inherent danger of the fire. Here are some helpful reminders on behavior that can make your next campfire a positive and safe experience.

Handbooks for each program have useful tips for campfires.

Smart behaviors around a campfire

- Fires are useful, but they can be dangerous. Always respect a fire by showing smart behaviors.
- Stay outside of the campfire ring. Do not touch any part of the fire ring once the fire has been lit.
- Don't run, jump, or play around campfires. Understand that fires can cause injuries.
- "Once it's in, it stays in." Don't pull anything out of the campfire.

Maintain a safe campfire and campsite

- Always consider the campfire's surroundings. Ensure the campfire is the appropriate distance between the seating areas and tents.
- Verify federal and local regulations regarding fire bans and policies.

Cooking or roasting over a campfire

- Never swing, flick, or throw hot or burning food. If your food burns or catches fire, remain calm.
- Maintain a safe distance while cooking. Use a skewer long enough to keep your body outside the fire ring or containment area.
- Be careful with sharp skewers and keep the tip pointed in a safe direction. In the dark, others may not see the skewer. Prevent injury to others by being responsible. Maintain spacing with others around the fire.

ADULT LEADER REQUIREMENTS FOR OVERNIGHT ACTIVITIES

There has been some confusion on the new adult leader requirements for overnight camping, so we put together a FAQ to assist in implementing it in your unit. The original article is listed below.

Q: What is the new policy?

A: Every adult present at an overnight activity must submit an adult application and registration fee, undergo a criminal background check, a volunteer screening database check and must complete mandatory Youth Protection training.

Q: Who does this apply to?

A: Adults attending any Scouts BSA overnight activities

Q: Who does this NOT apply to?

A: Cub Scout parents & legal guardians attending with their children do not need to register. (All other adults need to be registered.)

Q: What part of the policy changed?

A: Previously, adults attending less than 72 hours at an overnight event were not required to register. This part of the policy has been removed.

Q: Why was this change made?

A: As part of our ongoing commitment to abuse prevention, the Boy Scouts of America is updating the adult supervision requirements for overnight activities. This update enhances the minimum "two deep leadership" requirements by additionally requiring every adult present on overnight activities to be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America.

Q: When does this become effective?

A: All Cub Scout Packs, Scouts BSA Troops, Exploring Posts, council, and district overnight programs will be required to comply with this update by September 1, 2023

Q: How does this affect leadership requirements for Scouts BSA Summer Camp in 2023?

A: Any adult attending Camp Klaus for Scouts BSA summer camp as a leader was already required to become a registered leader, and that policy will remain in place.

POLICY UPDATE: BSA'S BARRIERS TO ABUSE

As part of our ongoing commitment to abuse prevention, the Boy Scouts of America is updating the adult supervision requirements for overnight activities. This update enhances the minimum "two deep leadership" requirements by additionally requiring every adult present on overnight activities to be a registered member of the Boy Scouts of America. These adults must submit an adult application and registration fee, undergo a criminal background check, a volunteer screening database check and must complete mandatory Youth Protection training.

What does this mean for you? The previous "72-hour rule" (which allowed for an adult attending an overnight event not to register if attending for less than 72 hours) is eliminated.

A limited exception for parents and legal guardians of Cub Scout youth attending overnight with their children is planned due to the family centric nature of Cub Scouting. All Cub Scout Packs, Scouts BSA Troops, Exploring Posts, council, and district overnight programs will be required to comply with this update by **September 1, 2023**. As a reminder, any adult attending Camp Klaus for Scouts BSA summer camp as a leader was already required to become a registered leader, and that policy will remain in place.

SCOUTS BSA SUMMER CAMP - BE PREPARED

Merit Badge signup opened on April 4th.

All merit badge signup is completed online at scoutsiowa.org. When signing up, please use Scout's legal name and enter their Member ID number. This will allow for upload of completed requirements to Scoutbook at the conclusion of camp.

Camp Registration

We ask that individuals pay and sign-up with their troop - the troop then provides a list of names and one check for registrations to Northeast Iowa Council.

- In Council registration is \$315 per Scout until April 29, 2023 and \$135 per adult.
- Out of Council registration is \$335 per Scout until April 29, 2023 and \$135 per adult.
- Scouts participating in BASE Camp are charged an extra \$10.00 due at registration.



Adult Registration Reminder

All adults attending camp for any length of time must be registered with the BSA.







Each headstone had a hole drilled to affix the repaired marker, then once the marker was placed the hole was sealed to prevent damage to the headstone. Any headstones that were in need were cleaned. The affixing of markers to the headstones ensures their safety and use for years to come.






