Some numbers from the breakfast; we plan for 1400-1500 people and with good weather we usually get 1200-1300 but the weather in 2025 was the best since 2016 and we feel we served close to 1550 people at the breakfast and made a profit of over \$5,000.

We will keep some things the same, like Mickey Mouse Pancakes, table center pieces, and the bright faces of the Arrowmen and Arrow women serving the community and moms. We introduced some new things; chafers for holding the hot eggs, cheese sauce and salsa on the serving line, replaced the handwashing sink, supplying our own garbage cans, separating out food waste, looking for recycled items



to be used and recycling items we use at events. We will investigate doing more at the next breakfast.

In 2025 we did not have the annual stick pick up due to the park being used for a frisbee tournament, at the request of the Parks Department.
