







96% of alumni and 96% of current youth Scouts agree that **Scouting has had a positive effect on their leadership abilities.**




95% of alumni and 85% of current youth Scouts agree that **Scouting has positively influenced their ability to overcome adversity.**


RAISING FLAGS. BUILDING CHARACTER

When the sun rises on Memorial Day, Independence Day, and other national holidays, Scouts across Dubuque are already hard at work. Their mission? To transform neighborhoods into a sea of red, white, and blue through the Avenue of Flags program—a tradition that teaches patriotism, responsibility, and community pride.

For eight years, **Troop 5 has joined Troops 7, 51, and 91** in partnership with the Dubuque Noon Optimist Club to place nearly 2,500 flags across the city five times a year. This effort is more than a display of flags—it's an opportunity for Scouts to live out the values they pledge every day: loyalty, helpfulness, and cheerfulness. As Star Scout Griff Roberts explains, "It symbolizes our nation and reminds people we are celebrating a national holiday and the freedom people fought for."

The program also teaches the value of earning your way. Scouts receive funds based on participation, helping pay for summer camp and other adventures. "Scouts who help at every opportunity can earn enough to pay for camp and then some," shares Troop 5 Committee Member James Frett. It's a practical lesson in being Thrifty and taking ownership of their experiences.

Through rain, heat, cold, and wind, Scouts remain cheerful and committed. Their presence sends a powerful message: young people are willing to work hard and honor the freedoms we cherish. This partnership is more than a fundraiser—it's a tradition that strengthens character, builds community, and reminds us all what it means to **serve**.
